

Political prisoners in Colombia are typically students, farmers, trade unionists, indigenous people or Afrodescendants. They have been imprisoned unjustly for their ideas, their involvement in social movements or human rights causes, or simply for being in the wrong place at the wrong time.

These men and women find themselves imprisoned with little recourse under the constant watch of the same State which considers them to be an internal enemy threat. Hence, the positions of political prisoners of all categories are extremely vulnerable. Treated like animals, criminals in the eyes of society, they have been erased from the social reality and choked from history.
